The original hopscotch courts were over 100 feet long and used for military training exercises.






HOPSCOTCH


Roman children drew their own smaller courts in imitation of the soldiers, added a scoring system and "Hopscotch" spread throughout Europe.











A Scaffold



A 'scaffold' ensures that children aren't left to their own devices to learn something.

The support, or scaffold, is removed when the student is ready.
